HOLDENVILLE MAYOR ELECTED TO OKLAHOMA MUNICIPAL LEAGUE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

(January 14, 2016) Holdenville Mayor Beverly Rodgers was appointed to the Oklahoma Municipal League (OML) Board of Directors during their January 6th meeting to be the District 5 representative.

Mayor Rodgers became an elected official in 1983 and has dedicated her life to public service. She was elected Mayor of Holdenville in 1983 and served this position until 1987. After four years as Mayor, she returned to school to obtain her Juris Doctorate from the University of Tulsa. After law school Rodgers held positions of City Attorney, Midwest City; Assistant City Manager, Sapulpa and City Manager of Okmulgee. In 2015 she was once again elected Mayor of Holdenville. Municipal government is truly her passion.

Just as she returned to Holdenville as Mayor, she has returned to be a member of the OML Board; as she previously served on the Board from 1986-1987. Asked about her election to the Board, Rodgers said "I think it is exciting to once again be able to serve on the Board of Directors for OML. It will be interesting to note the changes."
