OKLAHOMA MUNICIPAL LEAGUE AND THE MAYORS COUNCIL OF OKLAHOMA TO HOST ANNUAL MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT DAY AT THE STATE CAPITOL

(March 13, 2017) Oklahoma City – The Oklahoma Municipal League (OML) and the Mayors Council of Oklahoma (MCO) will host a day at the capitol to celebrate Municipal Government Week on Tuesday, March 21st. The day will start off at 9:00 a.m. by recognizing the “If I Were Mayor” 8th grade essay winners as well as an update on legislation affecting cities and towns. Those attending will also have the opportunity to visit with their legislators regarding municipal issues or watch the legislative process live from the Gallery.

City and town officials from around the state are coming together for a day of activities that focus on educating citizens and advocating for municipal government. The week of March 20th through March 24th, 2017 has been proclaimed as Municipal Government Week by Governor Mary Fallin. Media outlets are invited to the event. Several municipalities will recognize the week by passing a local proclamation to demonstrate a continued commitment to, and celebration of, municipal government. Whether it's street maintenance, water service, or fire and police protection, city and town residents count on municipal government to provide those services on a daily basis.

Establishing a Municipal Government Week provides a unified statewide opportunity to educate citizens on what municipal government is all about and let them know that municipal government is of their making and requires their involvement.
